There appears to be a particular risk at bed time with Godfrey wanting to come into Betty's bedroom when she does not want him to.

Practitioner's notes

This risk assessment forms part of a Sec 42 safeguarding adult's enquiry. The initial concerns related to potential harm caused by Betty to Godfrey. I believe that this was a retaliatory action and it did not result in significant harm. I will be meeting with Godfrey again to ask for his views about whether he faces any risk from Betty. When I met with him last week he expressed the view that he does not.

There is a risk that as Godfrey's dementia progresses Betty will become unable to protect herself against his behaviour. His behaviour appears to reflect past attempts to exercise coercive control over Betty within their marriage
